Adult Education - We continue our marking Evolution Weekend as a way of emphasizing the compatibility of religion and science. **Bruce Yaeger** will explain what really occurred during and after the famous 1925 Scopes "Monkey" trial over the teaching of evolution. His presentation is titled "The Jail and Torches that Never Were: Debunking the Scopes-trial Myth." Many people have heard of the Scopes trial but know mostly falsehoods about it (such as perpetuated by the movie *Inherit the Wind*). Getting a true picture of the trial can help us understand how we in the U.S. got to where we are today. Bruce Yaeger, a teacher for over 35 years, is the author of two books, including *Wrestling Brothers: Rethinking Religion-Science Relationships*.
