⁺Opening Sentences

The resurrection stories of the New Testament need neither be taken as fact or reinterpreted to appear scientifically acceptable.

They can be left as they are: myths of meaningfulness.

They are the poetry of reverence.

They are the stories of the reaffirmation of life that even death cannot end.

They are the songs of the experience of a people, who having experienced grief and loss and disillusionment, felt a restoration of their hope.

Presenting a Bible to Grayson Stepp:

Minister: Every week we read from the sacred stories together and each of us understands them a bit differently. Listening together we can hear many things.

People: Thus we are joined as a community of interpreters, giving and receiving in our search for what is sacred.

Director of Children and Youth: One of our customs is to offer our children the sacred stories in the hopes that they will read them carefully and offer us their insights.

People: For we affirm that every person has access to the divine and all of us gathered are illumined by an inner light.

Minister: There is one among us, Grayson Stepp, who is in his tenth year of life. In our Covenant tradition, we honor this age by welcoming him into the community of interpreters. Together we have much to learn from each other. Grayson, we would like to give you the stories that are sacred to us.

Director of Children and Youth: Will you read them and think about them always remembering that they are meant to teach us love for God, our neighbors, and our world?

Grayson: I will read these sacred stories and learn from them what they mean.

People: Then together we will join with you, Grayson, and with others in the great and ongoing conversation among interpreters. We will share our understanding, our experiences, our questions, and our hopes as we read from the sacred stories and open ourselves to the dialogue that follows. We welcome and affirm you as a companion in this process.
